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CHAPTER-I

INTRODUCTION.

Background information.

- 1.1. In order to have a realistic meaningful and successful planning for the rural masses, the first pre-requisite is to assess the extend and intensity of poverty. The general development strategy could be visualized only when we know the capacity of people to accept a programmer or to put in matching resources. In the absence of proper need assessment and the capacity of formally react to a programmer, the chances are that there would be non-utilization, under utilization or even diversion of the available resource! to the wrong target group. A serious consideration of feasibility cannot be ignored while planning for the rural masses.
- 1.2. The members of the Mon District Planning & Development Board has therefore felt it necessary to carry a survey on rural saving and ii utilization. This tasks was entrusted to the District Evaluation Office, Mon by the Mon District Planning & Development Board. Accordingly this survey was carried out by the District Evaluation Office Mon.

Objective of Survey.

- (i) To find out the various small savings.
- (ii) To study the socio-economic profile of the selected rural households.
- (iii) To trace out the sources, of income and its utilization and
- (iv) To assess further savings potentials if any.

Reference Period.

1.4. The reference period for this survey is die year 1992-1993.

Sampling Method.

- 1.5. After the selection of village for this survey, the entire house-hold of the village are listed. Then one household in every sixteenth house holds were pick up randomly for the purpose of this survey.
- 1.6. The surrey was conducted in Men district only.

Main Occupation of the Selected Village.

1.7. Jhum cultivation is the main occupation of the people. People also engaged in weaving, blacksmith and other handicrafts to meet their own requirements and nor for commercial purposes. No other framings or other activities for generating income ate found. To wean away the farmers from extensive jhuming practice, the technique and benefit of terrace rice cultivation was demonstrated to the farmers but no impact is found to have been developed. Rice, millets, yam and meat form part of the stable diet of the people.

Methods of data collection.

- 1.8. Primary data was collected directly from the selected respondents by using households interview schedule. Further with the help of various officials and informers secondary data was sought.
- 1.9. In order to collect the requited data from the respondents a set of pre-tested interview schedule were administered.

Limitation of the Survey.

1.10. The survey could not cover a numbers of villages due or shortage of staff and lack of conveyances. As such, die survey may not reflect the entered rural position of the Mon District. Moreover, the rural households are not keeping account of incomes and expenditure. All the information collected are out of memory of the respondents. Hence, the data may not be treated as the accurate figures.
